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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

As this newsletter is being put together, I am reminded by the shorter daylight hours that soon we will be enjoying lower temperatures and welcoming our seasonal residents and winter visitors back to our community. It will be nice to reconnect with our friends and neighbors and catch up. I am sure that many of them will be surprised by the changes since their last visit as well as the high level of development and construction activity in our community – even a STEM school being built near Hohokam Park. Rancho Vistoso continues to be recognized as a very desirable community to live in and that is what leads to development. Right now you cannot drive very far in any direction in our community without encountering major road work or construction projects.

It is with this in mind as we enter the higher population winter season in our community, that, I want to ask everyone to exercise even more responsibility for their own safety and the safety of everyone around them when going about our daily activities. When driving, biking, walking or hiking we will likely have to deal with different traffic patterns, temporary lane closures, construction traffic etc. over the next six months to a year. Please do your part to make our community safe.

At the August 25, 2016 Board meeting, Mr. Dick Surowiec was appointed to fill the seat vacated by Mr. Ed Jarrett. When a vacancy occurs after a recent election, the Board reviews the candidates that ran for the position during the election and appoints from that group if possible. Mr. Surowiec accepted the Board's offer to serve out the remaining term of the vacated seat and we are very fortunate to have him as a member of the RVCA Board. Dick brings to the Board his experience of long term service on the Vistoso Highlands #1 Board and a strong commitment to community service since moving to Rancho Vistoso more than ten years ago.

Looking forward, the Finance Committee is beginning to develop the 2017 Budget for Board review at the October Board meeting. The budget is then used to set operational and project priorities for the coming year.

Longer term, the Board of Directors is beginning to take a preliminary look at what RVCA needs and what priorities there will be in the five year and beyond period. Current projections indicate that RVCA will be essentially built out in approximately five years with no large tracts of land remaining for development. As a result, it is not too early to start planning for that period.

As we progress further into long term plan considerations, the Board will be seeking input and support from residential and commercial members of RVCA.

Thank you for your continued support and volunteer involvement in making Rancho Vistoso the kind of community in which we can all be proud.


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Disaster Preparedness Training Offered In Oro Valley

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

Golder Ranch Fire District Reminds the Public of the Importance of Being Prepared.

We're prepared. Are you?

September is National Preparedness Month. Are you and your family prepared for a major disaster? Disasters like Hurricane Katrina and 9/11 have put the issue of preparedness at the forefront but most people still confess that they have not taken the necessary steps to empower themselves with the essential materials needed to survive for up to 72 hours. Golder Ranch Fire District would like to charge the public with the task of creating a 72- Hour Preparedness Kit for their families.

Items to pack in your 72-hour preparedness kit

- **Water:** 3 gallons per person to last 72 hours
- **Food:** ready to eat canned meats, fruits, vegetables, infant food, etc.
- **First Aid Kit:** bandages, anti-bacterial ointment, cold packs, antiseptic wipes, etc.
- **Drugs:** prescription drugs, aspirin, anti-diarrhea medication, etc.
- **Tools and Supplies:** cups, plates, plastic utensils, battery powered radio and extra batteries, flashlight with extra batteries, scissors, etc.
- **Sanitation:** soap, toilet paper, garbage bags
- **Clothing and Bedding:** rain gear, hats and gloves, etc.
- **Baby Items:** formula, diapers, bottles, etc.

- **Extinguish all candles before leaving your home.**

- **Carry a flashlight to light the way.**
- **Glow sticks are fun and can also be used to make you more visible.**
- **Use the buddy system while going door to door.**
- **An adult should accompany Trick-Or-Treaters of all ages on their Trick-Or-Treating adventures.**
- **Trick-Or-Treat in well- lit neighborhoods that you are familiar with.**
- **Carry a cell phone if possible.**
- **Candy should be reviewed by an adult at the end of the night to make sure that there is nothing that may be contaminated, trigger a food allergy, become a choking hazard and otherwise be unsafe to eat.**

COMPLIANCE CORNER

Article IV, Section 4.5 of the CC&R's refers to the Architectural Committee and its role. While the section is lengthy it simply states: Any exterior modification that changes the appearance of the outside needs to be approved by the Committee.





With e-billing and e-banking becoming more and more popular, we offer a convenient way to pay your homeowner assessment. It's a simple process and there are absolutely no fees for doing so.

Go to the Rancho Vistoso HOA web site (<http://ranchovistosohoa.com/>) and under the HOA documents and forms link there is another link for the Automatic Payment Form. When you download this form fill out the document, attach a voided check and send to Associa at the address shown for the local office.

The automatic payment for the quarterly assessment is processed approximately the 4th day of the quarter billing month (January, April, July and October).

If you are already on automatic payment, you don't need to do anything; however, if you change your bank or address within Rancho Vistoso, fill out another automatic payment form and send to the Associa office 15 days prior to the quarterly billing cycle.

If on automatic pay, you will no longer receive an invoice, you'll just have to make the appropriate entry when reconciling your checkbook register.

Remember, there are absolutely no fees associated for automatic pay.



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Overseed



We can enjoy green grass all year long in Southern Arizona, even though the winter and summer climates are very different. The way this is done is by growing Bermuda grass in the summer and Rye grass in the winter.

The best time to overseed Bermuda with Rye is from the middle of September to the middle of October. A general rule is that when the temperatures at night are consistently around the 60°F range, the seed is ready to plant. If planted too early the newly germinated Rye grass will require too much water and the condition can result in fungus killing the new grass. Also, when the weather is still hot the Bermuda is still actively growing and will compete with the Rye seedlings. Plant too late and the Rye germination will be slow because the weather isn't warm enough. So, there is a relatively small window of opportunity.

Steps to a successful transition:

- To prepare the Bermuda Grass for overseeding, scalp it as short as possible.
- After scalping the Bermuda should be de-thatched.
- Next, sow the grass seed using a drop spreader
- Check the sprinklers for full coverage of the area to make sure there are no dry spots.
- Apply Ammonium Phosphate fertilizer (16-20-0) to the seeded area so the newly emerging roots will have readily available nutrients to establish.
- Water the new seed as needed to maintain continuous moisture on the seed.
Irrigate in short cycles at least 3 to 4 times per day.
- Once germinated, gradually reduce the watering cycles and increase watering time as the new roots establish in the soil. Do not over-water or the new grass will go yellow quickly.
- Your new lawn should be ready to mow about one month after seed is planted. Rye grass likes to be mowed at about 2.5" to 3".

Summit North Now Available

Center Pointe new home sites were recently released. Summit North is a gated community with 47 home sites! A total of 343 home sites in five distinct neighborhoods with six gated entrances are united by an interconnected trail system that leads to a 6,000 square foot luxury pool complex, interactive splash park, a community park with activity lawns, shaded play structures, butterfly garden and more.



Eagles Summit - 75 home sites located on Moore Road. They are currently building the Sales Center and some homes are already built.

STEM School - The site has been graded, the plant nursery is set-up, and several areas have been fenced off that will remain untouched. The TCSS rescued over 1600 plants and cactus from the site of the new STEM Elementary School.

VISTOSO COMMUNITY PARK INFORMATION

There are currently ten parks in Rancho Vistoso, eight of which are owned by the Association and all of which may be used by all residents. Honey Bee Park on Rancho Vistoso Boulevard is owned and maintained by Pima County. Honey Bee Park offers trails, several ramadas and restrooms. The following are the parks and various amenities that are offered at each.

- **Wildlife Ridge Park** – 12250 N. Woodburne Avenue: tot lot, baseball diamond, basketball, volleyball court, trails, one ramada, picnic tables, barbecues, restroom facility
- **Sunset Ridge Park** – 500 W. Klinger Canyon: picnic tables, barbecues, tot lot, volleyball, basketball, no ramadas, no restrooms
- **Hohokum Park** – 799 W. Desert Fairways: tot lots, basketball, volleyball, tennis courts, trails, picnic tables, barbecues, three ramadas, restroom facility
- **Big Wash Park** - off Vistoso Village Drive: tot lot, benches, trails, no restrooms
- **Somerset Canyon** - off La Canada: tot lot, ramada, picnic benches, barbecues, no restrooms
- **Cortona Park** - off La Canada: located in the new Pulte subdivision this park has a ramada, picnic benches, barbecue, no restrooms
- **Monticello Park** - off La Canada: located in the new Pulte subdivision this park has a tot lot, basketball court, ramadas, picnic benches, barbecue, no restrooms
- **Woodshade Linear Park** - on Rancho Vistoso Boulevard: this is a paved trail that has several areas with picnic benches, which leads to Sunset Ridge Park
- **Torreno West** - off La Canada North and Moore Rd: tot lot and picnic tables and is partially fenced as it is near a road
- **Torreno East** - off Desert Fairways East of La Canada: several benches and a basketball court

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
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
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
